### **Objectives and Aims**

Portsmouth Cathedral: a beacon and safe haven, anchored in Jesus Christ.

For centuries Portsmouth Cathedral has been a beacon for people on land and at sea, helping them navigate the passage of time with faith and confidence in God. It is a building of greatness and simple enduring beauty, and a lively, inclusive, and compassionate community which has a positive impact on the lives of people in its own parish, as well as the City and Diocese of Portsmouth.

2022 represented a return to pre-Covid operations as Government regulations were reviewed, relaxed, and removed. It was a welcome return to fully gathering in-person as a worshipping community. As a community, the Cathedral celebrated the major church festivals fully in the Cathedral for the first time since 2019, participated in the civic life of our City and nation through the annual Civic Service, the Seafarers Service, the celebrations of her late Majesty's Platinum Jubilee followed in September by being a focal point locally for the national mourning following the late Queen's death in September to name, but a few. All these services and activities were made possible through the excellent music of our Cathedral choirs and specially designed services.

Our Fresh Expressions service, Pompey Sundays, continued to grow in numbers as did the weekly Wednesday gathering of pre-school children with their parents/guardians for Pompey Tots.

Live performances returned to the Cathedral, including: a performance of Handel's Messiah; a Jubilee-themed weekend of music for the Platinum Jubilee led by Cathedral musicians and the Solent Symphony Orchestra, light shows in the Cathedral for "Cathedrals at Night" and our summer activities accessible to all of Portsmouth and the wider Diocese.

The Cathedral remained focused on the conservation of the fabric for current and future generations. Chapter continued to work towards its goal of achieving carbon net zero by 2030 with further steps taken in 2022 to reduce our carbon footprint.

Underpinning all activities is our Vision and Strategy. Launched in 2020, with six separate, but interdependent strands, it remains central to the work of the Cathedral as we seek as a Cathedral community to live out our mission.

The following pages highlight our work relative to each objective and how progress has been made to help realise our vision to be 'a beacon and safe haven, anchored in Jesus Christ.'

A reminder of these six objectives with their associated progress measure:

#### Worship and Music

We are committed to offering worship to God on behalf of the whole community, and serving the needs of many individuals, groups, and organisations. With excellence in music, imaginative use of space, nurturing the gifts of all and using the rich resources of liturgy – both traditional and contemporary – the worship at Portsmouth Cathedral will continue to draw people to God, reflect the beauty of Christ and invite all-comers to a deeper experience of the sublime.

- o PM2: Engagement with community organisations through worship
- PM3: Outreach events involving music.

#### Growing and Learning

We are whole-hearted in seeking to grow in faith, learning, and participation, enabling encounter with the living God for all ages through education, nurture, and the arts. We are working to inspire our visitors through creative engagement, and to embed learning and feedback in all that we do.

### **Achievement and Performance**

### Worship and Music

The installation of the Right Revd Dr Jonathan Frost as the tenth bishop of Portsmouth in March 2022 was a highlight of the year. The Cathedral was packed with a congregation from across the diocese and wider community and included wonderful music and liturgy shaped by our new Bishop's focus on young people. 1,797 people viewed the service on-line via the Cathedral and Diocesan YouTube channels.

As well as our own Cathedral Choir, children from Cathedral Sing and Choir Church sang. Two Charter Academy students, Christina and Areen, led Bishop Jonathan in and out of the Cathedral. In his sermon, the Bishop encouraged us to 'offer what we can' in the face of the seemingly overwhelming needs of the world, and discover what God can do when we take the next step in faith and trust.

In addition to providing for six sung services a week during term time, Worship and Music continued to provide that beacon for our city, diocese and wider partners including:

- Civic Service and Commemoration following the death of Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth alongside the Cathedral being a focal point of mourning in the region.
- "Falklands 40" with 400 veterans in attendance
- Eucharist to commemorate the 40th anniversary of the raising of the Mary Rose
- Royal Naval Benevolent Trust Centenary Service
- Women's Royal Naval Service Association laying up Standard and Dedication of new Standard
- Annual Civic Service incorporating The Portsmouth Jazz Mass and the music from the film "Interstellar" with special reflection on the situation in Ukraine.
- Annual Service for Seafarers
- Annual HM Royal Marines Band Service Memorial Day Service
- Sunday Service on BBC Radio 4 to celebrate Sea Sunday
- BBC Choral Evensong on BBC Radio 3

In Holy Week, our preacher was the Reverend Canon Tim Schofield (retired Canon Precentor at Chichester Cathedral). His series of reflections were on "Signs of Glory."

On Good Friday, our children's service year involved the children in making the Cathedral's Easter Garden, as well as singing and hearing about the passion and crucifixion. ITV came and filmed the service, interviewing participants, and featured it in their news bulletins.

For Advent and Christmas, congregation numbers returned to near pre-pandemic levels. Congregational giving over this period was just under £6,000 as opposed to just over £8,200 in 2019, but well above what was received during the Covid years of 2020 and 2021.

Pompey Sundays, the Cathedral's Fresh Expression service, continued to grow and develop as a diverse, all-age, pastorally supportive community, celebrating its first birthday at Pentecost. A music group has grown from an initial impromptu outing at Epiphany, and now has its own rota and steering group. The planning and leadership team consists of a mixture of lay and ordained people who have received feedback that this service is experienced as a welcoming and inclusive space, with accessible worship, by those new to church as well as by experienced churchgoers. Between 30 and 50 people attend this service each Sunday.

Baptism and Confirmation. Over the course of the year there were 10 baptisms and 122 confirmations, some of which were members of the Cathedral congregation.

Marriages. There were 6 marriage services held in the Cathedral during 2022 and one renewal of vows a year on, for a couple who had been married the 'first time' with minimum numbers possible during lockdown.

Funerals. Six funeral services and three memorial services were held in the Cathedral during 2022. May they rest in peace and rise in glory.

Cathedral Choirs. There are 24 boy choristers and 24 girl choristers plus new training choirs for our youngest singers in the choir. The back row of the Cathedral Choir is formed of five lay clerks and up to five Choral Scholars as part of our annual gap year scheme which also includes an Organ Scholar. The scheme enables up to six young people to spend a year developing their skills either before the start of university or at the end of their undergraduate degree.

Cathedral Sing, the Cathedral's outreach programme, brings the English Choral tradition out into the community working with over 400 children in 2022 including those from schools on the Isle of Wight and in November having a Cathedral Sing Evensong for St. Cecilia's Day here in the Cathedral.


Supporting choirs across the Diocese. In September, an RSCM 'Singing Day' the Cathedral welcomed 103 singers from across the diocese to work with the composer and conductor Philip Stopford. And late in 2022, for Gabrieli Roar – we hosted The Gabrieli Consort and over 400 young singers from schools across the region for a concert of Praetorius and Schutz – enabling access to the highest standard of music-making for children of all backgrounds.

Inviting parishes to their Cathedral. Invitations sent to all parishes when prayed for in the Diocesan Prayer cycle: several parish representatives, ministers and churchwardens have come on these occasions for Evensong. Tour and tea were then provided for parishes coming to the service.

The Electoral Roll. The roll of parishioners stood at 299 at the APCM in May 2022, an increase of 22 since 2021 and total of 46 since the new roll in 2019 (growth of just over 18% since 2019).

Every six years a new Church Electoral Roll is prepared. This took place in 2019 and everyone on the 2018 roll had to re-apply. The next renewal of the Roll will be in 2025. Details of the numbers since 2012 are outlined below where red indicates the start of the new Roll:

### **Growing and Learning**

Portsmouth Cathedral Institute. In 2022 the Institute ran four successful seminars, beginning with the revival of the annual Robert Dolling lecture, in which Professor Mark Chapman from the University of Oxford delivered an outstanding lecture on Fr Dolling's ministry in Victorian Portsmouth, along with reflections on the continuing relevance of that ministry today. The Institute also ran a well-attended workshop on the effective teaching of Christianity in our schools, and a seminar series entitled 'Six Texts that Changed the World' ran in June and July 2022. The seminar-based series attracts between 30-40 individuals each time.

Exhibitions. In May the Cathedral hosted The Big Draw which welcomed young artists-in-residence into the Nave, as City of Portsmouth College (formed from the merger of Highbury College and Portsmouth College) staff and students organised this community art project. The project had the joyful and topical focus of paper bunting, with a variety of themes covered: the Queen's Jubilee, the Queen's Green Canopy, sea pollution, and dots (a reference to International Dot Day, the aim of which is to boost creative courage through this simple and accessible medium). Integral to their enterprise was the need to work with others, so it was explicitly billed as a community project, with everyone welcome to join in. For some students, this was the first time they had set foot in a cathedral.

Pompey Tots. The Cathedral Toddler Group has been given a bright new look and rebranded as #PompeyTots, while continuing the popular format of a service in St. Thomas' Chapel, followed by playtime and refreshments in Becket Hall. Average weekly numbers for 2022 were nine plus parents and guardians but increasing as the year progressed.

Schools. As the Cathedral returned to pre-Covid operations we welcomed several individual school groups for visits and tours during the year. Members of the Ministry Team regularly visit local schools to take assemblies and services, as well as taking services for schools in the Cathedral. The Dean, Canon Kathryn and Canon Anthony sit on the governing bodies of Portsmouth Grammar School, Portsmouth High School, and Mayville High School, respectively. A Foundation Governor is provided for St Jude's CofE Primary School.

In June, annual Diocesan School Leavers' Services and Workshops took place in person for the first time since the pandemic. Over 1,000 Year 6 children attended in all; our team of education volunteers, working with the diocesan education team, organised workshops on prayer pyramids, labyrinths, a Lego challenge, and a reenactment of the Queen's coronation, whilst our Cathedral Sing team ran singing workshops on the hymns to be sung in the afternoon services, which took place each day after a picnic lunch on the Cathedral Green.

These days marked the culmination of a year's work on the schools' annual theme, 10:10#Flourishing (after John 10:10) and pupils gave engaging PowerPoint presentations on their work on the environment, spirituality, and good mental health, all linked to life in all its fullness. Each school had also brought flowers, made of recycled materials, to banners which were later displayed during the Wild Cathedral installation.

Children and young people's education and nurture. Confirmation classes were held in person for young people being (baptised and) confirmed by Bishop Jonathan at Easter Eve. Regular nurture sessions were held for our choristers, with a variety of guest leaders, on theological and environmental themes.

Adult education and nurture. In January and February, the Cathedral ran the Church of England's Living in Love and Faith course. This was well attended by people from the Cathedral congregation, Portsmouth Deanery, and the wider diocese. Good and honest conversations took place around the issues of sexuality and gender in our theology, faith, and lives. (Portsmouth Cathedral is a member of Inclusive Church.)

For a second year running, our Lent course, Art Tuesdays, was held online, with lectures on the theme 'Signs of Glory' given by the Revd Canon Howard Barker, the Revd Harriet Neale-Stevens, Joanne Bushnell (from Aspex Gallery, Portsmouth), Dean Anthony, and Pete Codling, a former artist in residence at the Cathedral.

Our Cathedral curates, the Revd Catherine Edenborough and the Revd Hannah Barraclough led a four-week Advent course on the theme of Waiting and Watching for Christ. Using guided meditations on scripture passages, the group looked at how God waits for us, waiting with anticipation, how we watch for God's prompting in our lives, and finally waiting for justice.

Volunteers. Volunteers are vital to our life and work at Portsmouth Cathedral, and our volunteers have worked with great heart and dedication throughout the year. Chapter is immensely grateful to each of them. Over the course of the year, the Volunteer Coordinator continued to streamline our recruitment and training processes, support our existing volunteers, as well as work with agencies and institutions across the City (including the Job Centre and The Hive) to recruit new volunteers.

In October the entire Cathedral Community was deeply saddened by the sudden death of Nadjia Carpenter, our Volunteer Co-Ordinator. In her short time with us, Nadjia transformed our volunteer on-boarding process. Please see the staffing section later in this report for how Chapter is remembering her life and her time with us.

### **Diocese and Community**

Deanery and Diocesan Synods. The Cathedral continues to play a full part in the life of the Portsmouth area Deanery, with Cathedral clergy and lay representatives attending meetings of the Deanery Synod. Canon Kathryn is a member of the Deanery Synod Standing and Pastoral Committee and represented the Cathedral at meetings of the incumbents of our Inner-City Cluster, at which partnership working was mapped out. Canon Kathryn is also a Diocesan Synod representative.

Participation with local communities. The Cathedral participated in the Christians at Pride stall, with welcome leaflets, at Portsmouth Pride on Southsea Common in June. Many good conversations were had with people of all ages. Canon Kathryn gave a talk on her work at a meeting of the Women's Institute in April.

Deanery and City Appeals. The Cathedral was pleased to contribute to our local community by collecting Easter eggs for distribution through the Roberts Centre (Deanery appeal), chocolate Advent calendars for the 'Chocolate Elf' project, food at Harvest and all year round for the Roberts Centre Food Bank, and vouchers for the Deanery Christmas voucher scheme, as well as a one-off collection of specific items at the outbreak of the Ukraine conflict.

Outward giving. Chapter continues to provide funds to support local, national, and international charities. Funds were granted to our partner Diocese of Sunyani, Ghana, Solent Mind, Stop Domestic Abuse, Toilet Twinning and the Roberts Centre.

Media - Engaging with the wider community. Canon Kathryn has written a faith column, highlighting Cathedral events, for our local newspaper, The News, at intervals through the year; and members of the clergy and Cathedral community have undertaken local radio and television interviews on various aspects of our life and work.

Our April Fools social media post on our "plans" to turn the Nave into a swimming pool garnered 394 likes, 115 comments and 98 shares.

Inter-faith partnership. Our annual Muslim Christian Evening with the Wessex Jamaat was again held online, this year with the theme, 'How is God calling us to respond to him now?' The event was well attended, and discussions were held in breakout rooms, about the impact of the pandemic on our faith, and what we might do differently now. There was music from our choir, and the traditional Annunciation readings from the Bible and the Qur'an.

### **Building and Heritage**

As the current custodians of this Grade I listed building and precincts, Chapter remains focused on both the conservation of the Cathedral for future generations and working to make the building ever increasingly functional to the needs of God's people today (e.g., live streaming capability) and managed in a manner that respects God's creation (e.g., Carbon Neutral 2030 targets).

Cathedral fabric - during 2021/2022 the Cathedral Architect undertook the Quinquennial Inspection. This inspection highlighted approximately £1.6 million in repair works needed for the Cathedral fabric over the period from 2022 to 2027.

Major works identified over this period include: a heating feasibility study; replacement of the heating system, major interior and exterior repairs to St Thomas's Chapel; external repairs to the south and north-east transept as well as internal decoration.

Of the £705,000 remaining to be completed from the 2016 Quinquennial Inspection, £223,550 of the most urgent works were completed during 2022, including repairs to the South Transept window, the South-West Nave porch, the Western towers including two new finials and the north Quire roof. Chapter is grateful to Covid-19 related major works and other government funding as well as private donations for making these works possible.

In late 2022, the Cathedral was grateful to receive confirmation that the Church Commissioners would fund 50% of the cost of the heating feasibility study. The Friends of Portsmouth Cathedral have also donated a substantial amount to enable this work to go ahead. This study, which is to be completed in the first half of 2023, will provide Chapter with options of how to best renew the Cathedral heating system, which is near the end of its useful and efficient life, in an environmentally and sustainable manner. The report is also an important document to support any bids Chapter may make for external funding of this project including the £190 million earmarked by the Church Commissioners for carbon neutral work on church buildings.

Funding was also approved in the 2023 budget for a revision of the Conservation Management Plan. The existing plan was produced in 2006 and is an important document in how to conserve the fabric of the building while ensuring it meets the needs of today. It is also important to support funding applications.

Responsible Stewardship – Energy and the Environment. Chapter is committed to reducing the Cathedral's environmental impact and embracing the Church of England's Carbon Net Zero 2030 ambition.

Working with Portsmouth City Council, the Cathedral planted four new wildflower areas on the Cathedral Green which are supported through altered mowing regimes. This has encouraged biodiversity and with other initiatives,

including the appointment of a Climate Change Champion, is part of our continued work toward achieving a Rocha Eco Church Silver status. Chapter remains grateful to the "Adams", our volunteer gardeners, for the care of the Memorial Garden and for tending the flowerpots and much more around Cathedral Green

During 2022 the Cathedral continued to 'recycle' energy bill savings and feed-in tariff income into energy efficiency projects. In Cathedral House, the roll-out of smart radiator valves was completed along with some extra pipework insulation. LED lighting was extended to the Cathedral House kitchen with funding received in late 2022 to complete the roll-out of LED lighting in the offices and public spaces of the building during the first quarter of 2023.

In the Cathedral a comfort questionnaire was undertaken in April, which helped inform a heating turn-down strategy for 2022/23. Allied to this, Chapter invested in some heat-cushions for volunteers (i.e., heat the person not the building strategy), undertook additional draught-proofing works and commenced a secondary glazing pilot. Temperature data continues to be collected to support heating-related initiatives.

Our 2022 energy carbon emissions experienced a significant reduction of 22% from 2021 driven by a combination of milder weather, further energy efficiency projects and a heating turn-down strategy in the Cathedral for the 2022/23 season – following on from the comfort survey conducted in April. Weather-adjusted emissions continued to fall reflecting our continued investment in energy efficiency and focus on good housekeeping.

- (3) Feed-in tariff (FIT) income earned under the UK microgeneration framework

### Highlights from 2022:

- Onsite electricity generation (solar panels and fuel cell mCHP) met in excess of 65% of electrical power demand in Cathedral House, another new record.
- Despite increased occupation and a doubling of electricity prices in Q4 we managed to limit the increase in gross energy spend across both buildings in 2022 to 4.7%.
- The Cathedral continued to recycle energy bill savings and FIT income (which is inflation linked) into energy efficiency projects to further reduce demand and carbon emissions.

- In the Cathedral, trials of heating cushions and secondary glazing commenced in Q4 alongside further draught proofing to various windows
- In Cathedral House LED lighting was extended to the Becket Hall kitchen

Chapter continues to embrace the Church of England's 2030 net zero carbon programme and plan from 2025 to publish our carbon emissions in line with their scope. Chapter intends to continue publishing weather-adjusted emissions for year-on-year energy efficiency comparison.

### Partnership and Engagement

Wild Cathedral. Supported by Portsmouth City Council's Queen's Platinum Jubilee Neighbourhood Grant, we created a sensory garden experience inside the Cathedral. The Cathedral team worked with Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust to raise awareness of their Wilder Portsmouth campaign, and local yoga instructor Kat Waters to provide yoga sessions in the garden. The Urban Sketchers Portsmouth group were invited to capture the garden through their artwork. For the Late-Night experiences, we collaborated with the folk artist, Katie Spencer, to create a soundscape. All these groups are now in conversation about future collaboration for projects with the Cathedral and yoga sessions have become a regular hire of the Cathedral with a well-established new audience.

Ports Fest. The Cathedral created a free activity as part of Ports Fest 2023 which reimagined the houses which once stood on the High Street in front of the Cathedral. This invited the community to help us create an art installation on the south front as part of this city-wide festival.

Jubilee – SSO Concert and Street Party. The Cathedral team worked with the Solent Symphony Orchestra to host a Platinum Proms concert. This was our first joint partnership concert with the SSO to share the financial responsibilities and increase engagement for both organisations. This resulted in increased attendance at the concert, and a new way forward. Our congregation, choir, and community (including the 12<sup>th</sup> Portsmouth Brownies) helped us create bunting to be displayed around the outside the Cathedral. We hosted a Jubilee Big Lunch inviting all those in our community to join us. This resulted in one of the largest street parties in Portsmouth.

Love Southsea Christmas Market. This was our second year of collaborating with Love Southsea for a Christmas Gift Market. Around 1,800 people visited the gift market during the two days that it was open.

The Cathedral Christmas Fair raised over £5,300 with these funds supporting the ministry of the Cathedral (over £4,400) as well as the Flower Guild (almost £250) and the PCCA (over £500). In addition, some stalls supported the work of the Roberts Centre and our link Diocese in Ghana, Sunyani.

Community Partnership. The Cathedral is a member of Shaping Portsmouth, the umbrella group that brings together businesses, educational and non-profit organisations for the betterment of the City and its people.

Bookings in Cathedral and Cathedral House. Across all events run in the Cathedral and Cathedral House that were developed and run by the Cathedral's Events Manager, in their first full year in post, there was an attendance of just under 12,000. There were 27 such events in the Cathedral and 216 in Cathedral House.

Highlights of in-house produced events included the 2,271 people who took part in Wild Cathedral, the 200 who participated in the Jubilee Street Party, 100 for Ports Fest and 60 for 'Cathedrals at Night'.

Highlights of external bookings included the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra, 'Yoga in the Cathedral,' the graduation ceremony for Portsmouth College and the use of the Nave by Cancer Research UK including music from the Cathedral choirs.

Warm Space. In response to a request from the local Women's Institute, in late 2022 the Cathedral launched a weekly "Warm Space" in Becket Hall on Monday afternoons. This ran through to March 2023 and was part of a national initiative in response to rising energy costs.

Lunch Club. This Club continues to meet fortnightly on Mondays and to provide an affordable two-course hot meal. There are 60 members with between 30 and 40 attending each lunch. We are very grateful to the volunteers who run the club, headed up by Rachael Forder.

The Cathedral also became a member of the Hampshire Chamber of Commerce during 2022. As we are one of the larger local employers in Portsmouth joining the Chamber is an important statement of our wish to work closely with businesses and organisations across the Diocese.

A practical example of our efforts included the development of the "Old Portsmouth Historic Trail." This initiative led by the Cathedral was designed to help draw more residents and visitors alike into Old Portsmouth. This initiative helps to underline our desire to work with and support local businesses, not-for-profit organisations and museums.

Charity hiring rate. In the latter part of 2022, a new hiring rate for charities was created. This was in anticipation of the 2023 review of charges, which has a fairer structure of hiring costs depending on the type of organisation booking. This hiring rate resulted in a spike of November and December bookings with events over the Christmas period generating gross income of just under £13,900 when it was minimal during the same period in 2021.

A space for the community. During 2022, our two community event spaces, Becket Hall and the Bishop Kenneth Room, were used by a wide range of local groups and schools including:

Cathedral Archivist; the "Adams" who care for the Memorial Garden; the 'Holy Dusters' who dust and clean each week; Cathedral Consort who sing alongside our paid choirs; the bellringers who help celebrate festivals and national events alongside regular weekly ringing and all who help to make the Cathedral a welcoming and holy place for worshippers and visitors alike.

Staff changes. 2022 was a year of significant staff changes and loss.

Farewells were made to the Head of Fundraising, Sophie Henstridge-Brown, whose work was transformational in bringing in both funds during the pandemic as well as her introduction of professional policies and practices with respect to fundraising including the annual Season of Generosity. Also moving on to new challenges were Jeremy Fisher (Lay Clerk), Sara Clark (Administrative Assistant), William Forrest and Daisy Sissons (temporary Administrative Assistants) and the scholars from the academic year 2022/23. We thank them for all they have contributed to Portsmouth Cathedral's mission and work.

Welcomes to the Reverend Hannah Barraclough, who joined us from Holy Week as a Cathedral Curate. lan Griffiths and Tom Marks started as Assistant Verger and Precinct Officers in June. Tom is on a temporary contract to enable our existing Assistant Verger and Precinct Officer, Maria Mann to provide cover during our Head Verger and Precinct Manager's maternity leave. Claire Martin joined in October as our temporary Finance Officer to enable Finance Officer Nicky Taylor Roberts to concentrate on special projects over the coming year.

In late autumn the Cathedral welcomed Pam Todd and Kelly Cooper as our permanent Administrative Assistants, Rayne Skora as the Visitor Experience Manager and Rachael Forder, who is already one of our choir matrons, in a part-time role as Volunteer Coordinator in November 2022. Welcome to them all.

Away for a while but returning in 2023. Head Verger and Precinct Manager, Malina Green, took maternity leave during 2022 with the arrival of Oscar. Many congratulations to her and her husband Adrian Green, a Cathedral Lay Clerk. Congratulations to Maria Mann who is acting up as Head Verger and Precinct Manager during Malina's maternity leave.

In memoriam. While each year brings the passing of people associated with the work and mission of the Cathedral, Chapter would like to publicly acknowledge the contributions made to the life of the Cathedral by two such individuals both of whom died suddenly and unexpectedly during 2022.

Our Volunteer Coordinator, Nadjia Carpenter, died suddenly in October 2022. In her short time with us she led a renewal of the Cathedral's approach to volunteers and was a bright and engaged member of the team. She was 26 years old. Chapter will install a circular wooden bench in her memory on Cathedral Green during 2023.

In December 2022, Stephen Fisher, Senior Audit Manager at Haysmacintyre, the Cathedral's external auditors, died unexpectedly. Stephen had managed the Cathedral's audit for over 6 years. His quiet, yet persistent guidance and challenge helped the Cathedral to improve how it managed its finances and reported on financial performance. He was 52 years old. Chapter has made a donation in his memory to the Girl Guides, the charity selected by his family.

May they both rest in peace and rise in glory.

### **Financial Review**

#### **Financial Performance**

2022 remained a year of cautious optimism as Chapter continued to work to reduce operating deficits while ensuring the longer-term viability of our activities and continued care of the fabric.

In November 2021, Chapter set a management account budget with a projected deficit of £97,147 on income of £884,236 and expenditure of £981,383. In the outturn for 2022 revenues rose to £918,564 while expenditure was contained to £897,984 leaving a surplus in management accounts of £20,580. This surplus amount was from unplanned income from legacies.

These figures translated into the Financial Accounts as a financial loss of £117,047 after unrealised losses & depreciation charges as outlined below. This included an unrealised loss of £166,547 on CCLA investments, but an increase in the value of investment property by £75,000 over the course of the year.

This is the third straight year where financial performance has ended the year near balance before unrealised gains/losses on investment. Chapter remains focused on containing expenditure and increasing revenue to support mission from a diverse number of sources including the congregation, events, visitors, and fundraising.

It is worth noting that even without a full-time fundraiser in place Chapter has continued to see grants received from the CSF, the City, trusts, and individuals.

Congregational giving is an important part of both providing income to support mission and is also an important part of Christian stewardship. Analysis for 2022 shows a decrease in planned giving. A reduction of £4,655 per annum in existing planned giving (plus any gift aid) was registered during the year. £2,000 of this decrease was due to the death of the person. Conversely, there was an increase in Direct Debit giving of £2,820 per annum in new planned giving (plus any gift aid).

After two years of substantial growth in congregational giving combined with cost-of-living crisis in 2021, a stable giving profile (excluding decreases due to the death of an individual) is welcome. However, an increase in congregational giving should remain a focus and Chapter will continue with its now annual Season of Generosity in June 2023.

It is also worth noting here that the small, but sustained investment Chapter has been making in energy conservation continues to pay dividends with the cost of energy falling from £37,868 in 2013 to £21,086 in 2022. Total energy emissions have reduced by 55% since 2013.

### **Investment Policy**

Chapter aims to keep a portfolio of investments that adopts a balanced approach to risk. The attainment of long-term objectives requires the acceptance of a level of investment risk, which manifests itself primarily in the fluctuation of the capital value.

Chapter holds its investments with CCLA. The Funds, required to be invested in accordance with the Statement of Ethical Investment Policy issued by the Church of England Advisory Group, had a challenging year in terms of performance given fluctuation in stock markets, with a net loss on investment for the year of £166,547 as at 31 December 2022. Income from these investments was £41,652 for 2022 (£42,723 in 2021, £44,335 in 2020 and £57,245 in 2019). Responsibility for the management of this policy rests with Chapter, but it is advised by its FIC to which Chapter has delegated decision-making on certain investment matters.

### **Reserves Policy**

Reserves are needed both to maintain the level of the Cathedral's current activities and to enable the completion of long-term projects. Maintaining general and designated reserves protects the Cathedral against a sudden deterioration in its financial results caused by, for example, a significant drop in income or a major repair project. It also provides a resource in the event of long-term planning or restructuring. Chapter has designated those reserves represented by investments, identified in these accounts as 'Investment Property' and 'Other Investments' and as of 31 December 2022 valued at £475,000 and £1,244,912, in the following manner:

- to retain until such time as needed a reserve of at least six months of ordinary activity (£650,000) to protect the Cathedral's operations.
- to allocate the remaining reserve (£1,244,912) in line with the new Vision and Strategy Portsmouth Cathedral: a beacon and safe haven, anchored in Jesus Christ. The current reserves allocation as outlined below remains in place until updated by Chapter to reflect the new Vision and Strategy:
  - > 10% for Worship and Music
  - > 10% for Growing and Learning
  - > 10% for Diocese and Community
  - > 50% for Building and Heritage including fabric works.
  - > 10% for Partnership and Engagement.

The emphasis on Buildings and Heritage reflects the £1.6million worth of works on the Cathedral (plus fees and VAT) identified by the 2021 Quinquennial inspection. Amongst key projects identified is the replacement of the ageing heating system by 2024.

In addition, Chapter has designated an amount of unrestricted funds, equal to the net book value of the tangible fixed assets, to reflect the fact that these funds are not readily realised and are utilised operationally.

Whilst the general fund shows a net current asset position of £93,514, given that the designated fund holds in excess of £1,244,912 in readily realisable investments, Chapter is content that any liabilities that can reasonably be forecast, over the foreseeable future, can be met as they arise.

### Risk Management

Chapter has identified the major risks to which it may be exposed and has set in place systems and procedures to mitigate them. There are sound internal controls in force to safeguard the Cathedral's assets. Suitable accounting policies and practice are long established and appropriate and required insurance is held. Budgets are set annually and measured monthly against actual outcomes.

The principal risks and uncertainties facing the Cathedral and the strategies in place for managing them are as follows:

["]	Failure to accomplish our purpose – Our new Vision and Strategy gives direction to our worship and work, and this is regularly monitored by staff and Chapter.

Through retaining an energy consultant and investing in on-site green energy, Chapter has decreased energy costs significantly over the last number of years. With energy prices rising significantly during 2022, Chapter will continue to monitor the situation and invest in capital projects such as solar arrays, insulation, use of LED lighting, and TVR remote thermostats to reduce energy costs where such investment is practical and represents a good
()	return on investment.  Failure to achieve balanced budget — Chapter is committed to seeking ways to generate new income and reduce spending and to increase current income. A multi-year financial plan is being developed and will be used to guide the Cathedral through to its centenary.
	Failure to manage risk — Chapter has begun to review the terms of refence of the Finance and Investment Committee and to create a risk and audit function within its committee structure in advance of the Cathedral's adoption of new governance arrangements under the new Cathedrals Measure. The development of a single risk register is a priority.

#### **Our Public Benefit**

Although the Cathedral (in 2022) falls outside the Charities Act and is therefore not regulated by the Charity Commission, Chapter has due regard to the public benefit guidance issued by the Charity Commission. The Cathedral not only serves the local community daily in its religious and charitable work and funding, but it is a resource in the promotion of religion, music, culture, and heritage. Within this Annual Report there is a description of activities that deliver these core public benefits.

### **Future Plans**

2022 was a year in which the life of the Cathedral returned to pre-pandemic ways of worshiping and working.

The Cathedral's financial position is much stronger than it was before 2019 thanks to the decisions Chapter has made, strong financial management throughout the year and focus on increased non restricted income. However, Chapter remains cognisant that there is more to be done to ensure the long-term financial health of the Cathedral.

The Vision and Strategy provides the focal point for our activities and the choices the Cathedral makes in terms of prioritising activities. Chapter remains committed to building a long-term financially viable Cathedral with "Finance and Sustainability" underpinning the other five strategic objectives.

As noted earlier in this report, planned giving has decreased slightly in 2022 mostly due to the death of individuals. But with congregations returning and growth in services such as Pompey Sundays, the annual Season of Generosity is an opportunity to renew discussion with those most closely involved in the work and mission of the Cathedral, the congregation.

Other practical steps include the work of the inaugural Visitor Experience Manager who took up post on I November 2022. Her early work for the first half of 2023 includes the development of a Visitor Experience Strategy and Shop Merchandise strategy designed to bring more visitors into the Cathedral each year. Pre-pandemic, of the 9.4 million visitors that visit Portsmouth per annum (Portsmouth Visitor Economy Update on Activity 2018 report.pdf), around 20,000 visited the Cathedral. Her work is focused on increasing visitor numbers to the Cathedral and to thereby increase donations and shop revenues.

During 2023, a refreshed approach to heritage interpretation led by the Visitor Experience Manager, Digital Marketing Manager, Cathedral Archivist and Head Guide will develop new ways to interpret and present our heritage and stories to the public. This includes exploring options for new exhibitions and interpretation materials, interactive experiences, and learning events programming.

Working alongside the above are our 2023 brand refresh and 2023 website redevelopment projects led by the Digital Marketing Manager. The brand refresh project will update and modernise the Cathedral's brand to better align with our vision and values, using the findings from our audience development research and agreed marketing plan to focus this work. It also includes a re-design of our logo and visual identity, as well as a refreshed tone of voice for our communications.

The Cathedral's website will be completely redeveloped, to make it more user-friendly and visually cohesive with the new brand refresh, with a focus on improving the overall user experience and ensuring that accessibility, performance and SEO (Search Engine Optimisation) are top priorities. This includes the integration of new and existing technologies such as chatbots, volunteer portals, and better content management for multiple authors.

The new website will also support the "Hire us Campaign" designed to bring more charitable and corporate hires of our facilities in both the Cathedral and Cathedral House. During 2022 funds were expended to make rooms in Cathedral House such as the Andrewes Room, Corner Meeting room and Becket Hall more attractive to external groups to hire. Investment in new visual equipment for the Cathedral will also help to make the venue more attractive for external hires.

With the Cathedral's centenary now just three years away, Chapter remains focused on how to physically mark this milestone, including how works will increase revenue to support mission.

### **Governance and Structure**

Portsmouth Cathedral is governed by the Chapter, a group of 11 appointed and elected individuals. They are supported by the Cathedral Council, Finance and Investment Committee, Fabric Advisory Committee, and the College of Canons. The Portsmouth Cathedral Development Trust is an independent registered charity which undertakes fundraising for major developments at Portsmouth Cathedral.

The Cathedrals Measure 2021 was given Royal Assent in April 2021, this legislation will bring all cathedrals under the jurisdiction of the Charity Commission in addition to that of the Church Commissioners. A significant amount of Chapter and senior staff time has been and will be dedicated to planning for the implementation of the Measure, which will see Portsmouth Cathedral becoming a registered charity in late 2023.

Operational Management. To oversee operations and financial management between Chapter meetings, a Senior Management Team (SMT) comprising the Dean, Canons Chancellor and Precentor and the COO meet at least biweekly except over the summer months and Christmas/New Year period. Chapter has approved terms of reference for SMT.

Recruitment of Trustees. In preparation for the new Measure, Chapter struck a Nominations Committee and granted a term of reference for its work on 23 November 2022. The retired senior civil servant, Canon Sir David Normington, GCB, agreed to be Chair of this Committee which is tasked with providing nominees for election to Chapter and its committees in advance of the Cathedral coming under the Measure in late 2023. The Committee is tasked with providing a rolling renewal of Chapter and Committee members on a three-year cycle.

The reports from the Social Care Institute of Excellence Safeguarding Audit of June 2021 and the Peer Review of February 2022 both remain living documents that are shaping how the organisation operates and evolves.

### The Chapter of the Cathedral:

The Chapter of the Cathedral comprises: the Dean ex officio, who is Chair and has a casting vote; all Residentiary Canons of the Cathedral ex officio; the Chair of the Finance and Investment Committee ex officio; and five lay persons: two appointed by the Bishop of Portsmouth after consultation with Chapter, one appointed by Chapter after consultation with the Bishop of Portsmouth, one Churchwarden and one elected by the Annual Parochial Church Meeting who may also be a Churchwarden.

The Vicar of the Parish is ex officio the Dean, whilst the Residentiary Canons are appointed by the Bishop after consultation with Chapter.

New members of Chapter receive briefing from the Chief Operating Officer (Chapter Clerk) and are also encouraged to attend external training provided by the Association of English Cathedrals (AEC). There is specific training provided by the Church Commissioners and the AEC for Deans, which Dean Anthony will be following.

The Cathedrals Measure 1999 requires that it shall be the duty of Chapter to direct and oversee the administration of the affairs of the Cathedral and to:

The new Cathedrals Measure given Royal Assent in April 2021, will, among other changes, bring cathedrals under the jurisdiction of the Charity Commission for the first time, and increase the percentage of non-executives on Chapter.

As part of preparing to come under the new Measure in late 2023, we have used the findings of the scheduled SCIE Safeguarding Audit in June 2021 to strengthen our policies and practice in this area. An action plan was developed and is in the process of being implemented. The Peer Review, organised by the Association of English Cathedrals, took place in February 2022. The findings are also informing the renewal of how the Cathedral operates in advance of it coming under the Measure.

Further written reports to Chapter from Executive members of Chapter (e.g., Canons Chancellor and Precentor) were instituted during 2020, reflecting best practice and anticipating the new requirements under the 2021 Measure. Also, while not currently required to do so under the existing Measure, the Cathedral has, for years, voluntarily published its annual accounts, welcoming comment and scrutiny.

Chapter is the ultimate decision-making body of the Cathedral and responsible for all strategic matters.

Chapter also has the responsibilities in relation to the accounts as set out on pages 28 and 29.

A list of Chapter members is shown on page 22.

#### Staff and volunteers

Chapter is assisted in the day-to-day implementation of its decisions by a team of paid staff led by the Chief Operating Officer (Chapter Clerk), together with numerous volunteers.

The policy on the remuneration of paid staff, including the Chief Operating Officer (Chapter Clerk), is determined by Chapter.

#### **Finance and Investment Committee**

The Constitution requires the setting up of a Finance Committee, known as the Finance and Investment Committee (FIC), with the function of advising Chapter in connection with its responsibilities in the field of financial and investment management. Chapter receives and acts with the guidance and the advice given to it by FIC. Chapter appoints the members of this Chapter sub-committee. This committee has been chaired by Mary Makin since January 2020.

#### Fabric Advisory Committee

Under the Care of Cathedrals Measure 1990, the Fabric Advisory Committee (FAC) is responsible to the Cathedrals Fabric Commission for England and considers applications from Chapter in regard to proposed development of and changes to the Cathedral's fabric.

There are eight voting members of the Fabric Advisory Committee: four appointed by the Cathedrals' Fabric Commission for England after consultation with Chapter, and four by Chapter after consultation with the Commission. The members appoint a Chair from among their own number. The Dean and Chapter Clerk attend meetings on behalf of Chapter, and other Chapter members are free to attend; no members of Chapter have a vote. The Cathedral Archaeologist and the Cathedral Architect have, under Section 4 of the Care of Cathedrals Measure 1990, a duty to attend meetings, although neither has a vote.

#### Cathedral Council

It is the duty of Cathedral Council to support the spiritual, pastoral, evangelistic, social, and ecumenical work of the Cathedral Church, to review and to advise Chapter accordingly, and to receive and to consider the annual budget and the report and annual accounts.

#### **College of Canons**

It is the duty of the College of Canons to receive and consider the annual report and audited accounts of the Cathedral Church and to discuss such matters concerning the Cathedral Church as shall be raised by its members.

#### Portsmouth Cathedral Development Trust (PCDT)

The Trust was formed originally in the 1980s and exists principally to receive funds from appeals made on the Cathedral's behalf and to make grants to the Cathedral in accordance with the terms of the Trust Deed and the relevant appeal.

The Trust presently holds funds arising from such appeals and donates them to the Cathedral under the terms of the Trust Deed.

As a separate charity with its own body of trustees, PCDT prepares its own annual accounts which are submitted to the Charity Commission. PCDT is chaired by Nigel Atkinson Esq, HM Lord-Lieutenant of Hampshire.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **Basis of preparation**

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Accounting and Reporting Regulations for English Anglican Cathedrals issued in December 2018 by the Cathedral Administration and Finance Association and UK Generally Accepted Practice including the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Cathedral is an exempt charity and a public benefit entity as defined in FRS102. The accounts are presenting in pounds sterling, which is the functional currency of the cathedral, and rounded to the nearest pound.

#### Going concern

Chapter has reviewed the funding available to the cathedral, in particular the level of reserves available in relatively liquid form, together with the expected future cashflows for the foreseeable future, being a period of at least 12 months from the balance sheet date. Chapter considers that are no material uncertainties over the cathedral's financial viability and that, accordingly, it is appropriate to prepare the accounts on a going concern basis.

#### Income and endowments

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the Cathedral is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably, and it is probable that the income will be received.

For donations, legacies, and grants to be recognised, the charity will have been notified of the amounts and the settlement date in writing. If there are conditions attached to the income and this requires a level of performance before entitlement can be obtained, then income is deferred until those conditions are fully met or the fulfillment of those conditions is within the control of the charity, and it is probable that they will be fulfilled.

Investment income is earned through holding assets for investment purposes as outlined in the notes to the accounts. It is included when the amount can be measured reliably. Interest and dividend income is recognised when the Cathedral's right to receive payment is established.

Income from the letting of investment property is recognised on an accruals basis in accordance with the terms of the rental agreement.

Income from the sale of goods in the Cathedral shop is recognised at the point of sale when ownership of the goods transfers to the customer.

#### **Expenditure**

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount can be reliably measured. Expenditure is classified under the following headings:

- Costs of raising funds comprise the costs of commercial trading and their associated support costs
- Costs of ministry comprise costs of clergy housing, services, music and their associated support costs
- Costs of cathedral precincts and upkeep comprise maintenance, insurance, utilities and their associated support costs
- Costs of education and outreach comprise educational activities, charitable giving and their associated support costs

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Support costs and governance costs

Support costs are those that assist the work of the Cathedral and include office costs, governance costs, administrative payroll costs. They are incurred directly in support of expenditure on the activities of the Cathedral. Where support costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities on a consistent basis as set out below:

- Salaries, recruitment, and training costs apportioned based on time analysis by employees and use of resources
- Administration apportioned based on approximate use of resources
- Information technology apportioned based on approximate use of resources
- Governance costs apportioned based on approximate use of resources

#### **Fixed assets**

In accordance with the Accounting and Reporting Regulations for English Anglican Cathedrals, no value is attributed in the balance sheet to the Cathedral as it is an inalienable and historic building for which no reliable cost information or conventional valuation basis is available.

The Regulations also require that no value is attributed on the balance sheet to heritage assets included in the Cathedral's statutory inventory acquired before 31 December 2018 and maintained in accordance with the Care of Cathedrals Measure 2011, because information on their historical cost is not available. The statutory inventory comprises items of architectural, archaeological, artistic, or historical interest.

Investment property is held at fair value.

Properties held for Cathedral use are held at cost, being the 2013 valuation, which was adopted as the deemed cost on transition to FRS 102 from 1 January 2015. No depreciation is applied to the deemed cost on the basis that any depreciation would be immaterial; however, the valuation is subject to an annual impairment review.

Enhancing works to property, office equipment, fixtures and fittings and other equipment above a threshold of £500 are capitalised at cost.

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost or valuation less estimated residual value of all tangible fixed assets (other than the deemed cost adopted on transition to FRS102) by equal annual instalments over their expected useful economic lives. The rates generally applicable are:

Property enhancements
Office equipment
Fixtures and fittings
Other equipment
331/3%

#### **Investments**

Investments are recognised initially at fair value which is normally the transaction price excluding transaction costs. Subsequently, they are measured at fair value with changes recognised in 'net gains/(losses) on investments' in the Statement of Financial Activities.

#### **Debtors**

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid, net of any trade discounts due.

#### I. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term, highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition.

### Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised when the cathedral has a present obligation resulting from a past event that is expected to result in the transfer of funds to a third party, and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount, after allowing for any trade discounts due.

#### Stocks

Retail stocks in the Cathedral Shop are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

#### **Pension Schemes**

The pension costs recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities represent the amounts payable to defined contribution pension schemes.

#### **Funds**

Unrestricted funds - general

Unrestricted funds are spent or applied at the discretion of Chapter in furtherance of the ministry of the Cathedral. Where necessary, unrestricted funds can be used to supplement expenditure made from restricted funds.

#### Unrestricted funds - designated

Designated funds represent funds earmarked by Chapter for a specific purpose. They may be un-designated at Chapter's discretion.

#### Restricted funds

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the Cathedral for particular purposes. Information on each restricted fund is set out in note 20 of these financial statements.

#### Endowment funds

Permanent endowment funds are funds where the donor has specified that the donation must be retained as capital or where the Cathedral has solicited endowment funds as part of a fundraising appeal. Income arising from the capital may be expended subject to any donor restrictions or restrictions arising from the fundraising appeal. Expendable endowment funds are funds where the donor has specified that the donation is capital in nature but has granted Chapter discretion to expend that capital. The income arising from the capital may be expended subject to any donor restrictions.

Further specific information is given in notes 20 to 22.

### Estimation uncertainty and judgements

The preparation of the financial statements requires Chapter to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities. The nature of estimation means that the actual outcomes could differ from those estimates. The following judgements have had the most significant effect on amounts recognised in the financial statements:

- Valuation of investment property
- Basis for non-depreciation of properties held for Cathedral use

Chapter uses the valuation performed by its independent valuer as the basis for fair value of investment property.

The stipends of the Dean and the above Residentiary Canons are paid directly from the Church Commissioners along with the related costs set out above. The remuneration of, and pension provision for, Clerical members of the Chapter are paid in accordance with scales laid down annually by the Church Commissioners, the Archbishops' Council and the Church of England Pensions Board.

Two other Canons, Nicholas Ralph, and Anthony Rustell are remunerated by the Diocese of Portsmouth. Anthony Rustell's wife is a member of the cathedral's Finance and Investment Committee, for which she receives no reimbursement.

Expenses of £602 (2021 - £0) were reimbursed to members of Chapter. Planned giving donations of £10,890 and other donations of £4,566 were received from related parties during the year.

There was an average of 10 (2021: 9) full time and 10 (2021: 9) part time paid staff including clergy paid by the Church Commissioners but excluding the Cathedral Choir. The full time equivalent of the same group in 2022 was 13 (2021: 14).

The aggregate remuneration of Key Management Personnel in 2022, including all benefits, was £205,785 (2021: £206,752). This group is defined as the remunerated members of Chapter and the Chapter Clerk/COO.

No member of staff was paid emoluments of more than £60,000 (2021: none).

The Dean is also a trustee of the Portsmouth Cathedral Development Trust, which is not considered to be a related party of the Cathedral. During the year a donation of £5,000 (2021: £1,000) was received from the PCDT.

# 23. CAPITAL COMMITMENTS

There were no material amounts contracted for but not provided for at 31 December 2022 or 31 December 2021.

#### 24. PENSION SCHEMES

The Cathedral participates in the Pension Builder Scheme section of CWPF for lay staff. CWPF is administered by the Church of England Pensions Board, which holds the CWPF assets separately from those of the Employer and other participating employers.

#### CWPF has two sections:

- I. the Defined Benefits Scheme
- 2. the Pension Builder Scheme, which has two subsections;
- a. a deferred annuity section known as Pension Builder Classic, and,
- b. a cash balance section known as Pension Builder 2014.

#### Pension Builder Scheme

Both sections of the Pension Builder Scheme are classed as defined benefit schemes.

Pension Builder Classic provides a pension, accumulated from contributions paid and converted into a deferred annuity during employment based on terms set and reviewed by the Church of England Pensions Board from time to time. Discretionary increases may also be added, depending on investment returns and other factors.

Pension Builder 2014 is a cash balance scheme that provides a lump sum which members use to provide benefits at retirement. Pension contributions are recorded in an account for each member. Discretionary bonuses may be added before retirement, depending on investment returns and other factors. The account, plus any bonuses declared is payable, unreduced, from age 65.

There is no sub-division of assets between employers in each section of the Pension Builder Scheme.

The scheme is considered to be a multi-employer scheme as described in Section 28 of FRS 102. This is because it is not possible to attribute the Pension Builder Scheme's assets and liabilities to specific employers and means that contributions are accounted for as if the Scheme were a defined contribution scheme. The pensions costs charged to the SoFA in the year are the contributions payable (2022: £26,216, 2021: £24,058).

A valuation of the Pension Builder Scheme is carried out once every three years. The most recent valuation was carried out as at 31 December 2019. The next valuation is due as at 31 December 2022.

For the Pension Builder Classic section, the valuation revealed a deficit of £4.8m on the ongoing assumptions used. At the most recent annual review, the Board chose to grant a discretionary bonus of 10.1% following improvements in the funding position over 2022. There is no requirement for deficit payments at the current time.

For the Pension Builder 2014 section, the valuation revealed a surplus of £5.5m on the ongoing assumptions used. There is no requirement for deficit payments at the current time.

The legal structure of the scheme is such that if another employer fails, Portsmouth Cathedral could become responsible for paying a share of the failed employer's pension liabilities.
